Sacandaga Tanawianta is the full blooded Algonquin Indian name of Jacob Philips, born 1860, who is buried in an unmarked grave in Newcomb. He was second husband to Mary Jane Chase, born 1853, who is buried in the Huntington cemetery in Newcomb.

She is daughter of Caleb Chase who had a house where the Rich Lake beach parking lot is. She was probably born there and is related to the other old Chase families of Newcomb.

Her first husband was William M. Alden, supervisor of Newcomb before he enlisted in the Civil War army. He wasn't in long before he was discharged because of contagious tuberculosis and he died at home soon after. They had 4 kids.

Jacob was the son of Sabattis Tiawaron of Canada and had a sister Annie Philips. There were dozens of related Philips families in Canada where they came from. No known relation to the Philips of Newcomb. Mary Jane had 2 more kids with Jacob.

Jacob was a guide in the Newcomb area for many years and was a great help to the surveyors of Newcomb lands. He and Mary, ran Aunt Polly's from about 1884-1887.

After that, they moved to Westport to raise cattle.

Jacob became a citizen at some point, maybe when he was older.

According to The Bio Review of 1896, Jacob and Mary were living in Lewis, N.Y. with 5 kids.

Their son Gerald, 1896-1956 was probably born there and lived in Westport later where his wife Hazel 1898-1957 is buried.

Jacob was in Florida in 1925 when his wife was dying in the Plattsburgh hospital. He refused to travel to see her. He just said "we all have to go".
